### AHD Hosts its Third Summer Institutes in 2017

The AHD PRIDE Program held its third Summer Institute this past June at the University of Arizona. We were happy to welcome our new cohort of nine trainees:

Nicole (Kau'i) Baumhofer, ScD is an Assistant Professor at the University of Hawai'i Manoa John A. Burns School of Medicine who is looking at the prevention of cardiometabolic disease through environmental, human, and food source wellness for Native Hawaiians. Egbe Egiebor, PhD is an Assistant Professor at the University of Illinois at Springfield who is investigating sleep disorders in African American and Hispanic males. Karen Florez, DrPH is an Assistant Professor at the CUNY Graduate School of Public Health and Health Policy who is interested in food behaviors and weight loss among Hispanic American families. Tanya Johns, MD is an Assistant Professor at The Albert Einstein College of Medicine Montefiore Medical Center whose project deals with cardiovascular and chronic kidney disease risk in African Americans and Hispanics. Lupita Montoya, PhD is an Assistant Professor at the University of Colorado Boulder who is investigating the effects of air quality on health outcomes for Native American children and elderly populations. Angela Rivers, MD, PhD is an Assistant Professor at the University of Illinois Chicago who is looking at Sickle Cell Disease in African American children. Brittany Smalls, PhD is an Assistant Professor at the University of Kentucky whose research addresses diabetes and cardiovascular disease risk in older ruraldwelling adults. Carolyn Harmon Still, PhD is an Assistant Professor at Case Western Reserve University who studies hypertension in African Americans. Kathy Wright, PhD is an Assistant Professor at the Ohio State University who investigates health promotion among African American males.


BSM Program Cohort 5 Attends Annual Meeting

This year the BSM PRIDE Summer Institute at NYU School of Medicine hosted its sixth cohort of scholars. A total of eleven energetic and talented junior faculty from various institutions across the country took part in a rigorous two-week summer training institute. The institute is consistent with the NIH strategy to promote diversity in the academic workforce. The overarching goal of the institute is to implement and evaluate innovative approaches to improve capacity to mentor underrepresented minority faculty for successful academic careers focusing on sleep-related cardiovascular diseases.

In addition, the BSM PRIDE Institute welcomed its third cohort of peer mentors this year. This initiative—under the leadership of Dr. Joseph Ravenell, Dr. Natasha Williams, and Dr. Adina Kalet—is designed to train successful former PRIDE scholars to become peer mentors for the new cadre of PRIDE junior faculty. Six PRIDE scholars from previous cohorts were selected to undergo one week of intensive training through the NYU CTSI Mentor Development Program (MDP). Led by Dr. Kalet, the MDP aims to ensure success of translational research by developing a new group of mentors. At the end of the training, peer mentors were paired with 1 or 2 scholars based on research interests. Currently, each new PRIDE scholar is receiving guidance from both peer and primary mentors.



Washington University welcomed Cohorts 5 and 6 to St Louis. Each Summer Institute was three weeks in length with Lectures on topics including Fundamentals of Genetic Epidemiology, Bioinformatics, Grant Writing and Information from NHLBI, Diversity, Career Development, and a Hands-on Phenotyping Laboratory. Each lunch was spent with grant development and brainstorming sessions with Mentees and Mentors.

#### Welcome Cohort 6:

Veronica Barcelona de Mendoza, PhD, MSN, APHN-BC, RN is an Assistant Professor at Yale School of Nursing. She is interested in perinatal health disparities: Effects of epigenetics and pregnancy health (preterm birth and preeclampsia) on cardiovascular outcomes (high blood pressure) in African American mothers and their children. Carlos Barrero, MD is an Assistant Professor at Temple University in the Pharmaceutical Sciences. He is interested in translational medicine, proteomics-metabolomics, and systems biology. He was recently promoted to Tenure-Track faculty and has recently filed for a new international patent.

**Yvonne Ford, RN, PhD** is an Assistant Professor at UNC Greensboro School of Nursing. She is interested in late and long-term cardiovascular effects of cancer therapy on African American women with 10 or more years of breast cancer survivors along with facilitators and barriers to adhering to physical activity and dietary guidelines among African American women with 10 or more years of breast cancer survivors.

**Mario Gil, PhD** is an Assistant Professor at University of Texas, Rio Grande Valley in the Department of Psychological Science. His research interests are: behavioral neuroendocrinology, development of animal models of neuropsychiatric disorders, and interaction between hypothalamic peptides and mesolimbic dopamine system in the regulation of behavioral responses to psychosocial stress.

Alfreda Holloway-Beth, PhD is an Assistant Professor at Chicago State University in the Department of Health Sciences. She is interested in occupational and injury epidemiology, outbreak investigation, epidemiologic surveillance, analyzing large administrative datasets, and health disparities. Additional interests are to measure both environmental and genetic variables among work cohorts and communities of color to identify risk factors that lead to negative health outcome related to cardiovascular and sleep diseases and comparing the health outcomes, occupational exposures, and genetic disposition of hair dressers that work with natural hair.

**Holly Jones, PhD, RN, CFNP, RNFA** is an Assistant Professor at the University of Cincinnati College of Nursing. Her interests include the use of telomere length in CVD risk assessment, objective stress measures, and long-term health outcomes for midlife Black women.

**Fabian Vazquez-Santiago, PhD** is an Assistant Professor at Ponce Health Sciences University in the School of Behavioral and Brain Sciences. He intends to look at approaches for assessing epidemiology or population distribution of angiogenic and cardiovascular remodeling genes, current perspectives on epigenetic mechanisms of CVD, and (epi) genetic-targeted therapeutic strategies against CVD.

On Monday July 17<sup>th</sup>, 2017, Dr. Mohamed Boutjdir, the Director of the PRIDE-CVD summer institute welcomed Cohort 6 to SUNY Downstate Medical Center for year 1 of the Summer Institute. Thirteen junior underrepresented scholars from across the country traveled to Brooklyn, NY to attend an intensive two-week curriculum in cardiovascular health disparities, grant writing workshops, and career development. The scholars were greeted and received a warm welcome from Dr. Keydron Guinn, the Vice President and Chief of Staff of SUNY Downstate on behalf of President Wayne J. Riley, Dr. James Knowles the Chair of Cell Biology on behalf of Dean Carlos Paro and Dr. Moro Salifu, the Chair of the Department of Medicine and Director of the Brooklyn Health Disparities Center, and Dr. Jonathan Marmur, Chief of the Division of Cardiology.

Cohort 6 Scholars came from the following institutions: Penn State University, Augusta University, California State University—Los Angeles, California State University—Long Beach, University of Michigan, Louis Stokes VA Medical Center, University of Illinois—Chicago, University of Houston, University of Mississippi Medical Center, Morehouse School of Medicine, Texas Tech University, Temple University, and the University of Miami.

As part of didactic training, cohort 5 participated in the PRIDE 5<sup>th</sup> annual meeting (April 24<sup>th</sup>-26<sup>th</sup> 2017) in Bethesda. Notably PRIDE-CVD had the largest number of PRIDE mentees that submitted grant proposals for review during the meeting. Several of our mentees also shared a revised grant proposal in the form of oral presentation or as a poster presentation. It is also worth mentioning that Dr. Anthony Pattin's poster presentation won 2<sup>nd</sup> place. Some of our mentees also served as grant reviewers.

The scholars presented the grants they've been working on all year to their peers and a panel of carefully selected external and internal faculty and peers as well. The FTGBDPRIDE Cohort 6 is comprised of 9 women whose research is focused on sickle cell disease (SCD). Dr. Jennell White is a Research Scientist at Wayne State University and is interested in understanding and validating adhesion as a biomarker of SCD severity. Dr. Oluwakemi Badaki-Makun is an Assistant Professor at John Hopkins University and her research focus is on the discovery of biomarkers for the diagnosis of acute chest syndrome in SCD. Dr. Nadine Matthie is an Assistant Professor at Emory University and her research studies focus on the improvement of quality of life and self-management of individuals with SCD.

Dr. Donna Whyte-Stewart is an Assistant Professor at John Hopkins University and her research studies is centered on the role of hemopexin and its association with silent cerebral infarcts in SCD. Dr. Oyebimpe Adesina is an Assistant Professor at the University of Washington and her research focuses on the role of osteonecrosis in chronic joint pains, degenerative arthritis, and impaired mobility in SCD.

Dr. Dora Clayton-Jones is an Assistant Professor at the University of Wisconsin and her research focuses on health equity in adolescents/young adults with SCD during transition to adult care. Dr. Lori Vick is an Assistant Professor at Bradley University School and her research is on understanding the health outcomes of individuals with SCD. Dr. Nnenna Ukachi is an Assistant Professor at Augusta University; her research is focused on pulmonary function status in young children with SCD. Dr. Venee Tubman is an Assistant Professor at Texas Children's Hospital and her research focuses on the combined impact of SCD and malaria on the immunologic function of the spleen.

After Summer Institute 1, we held a second Cohort 5 and Cohort 6 mentee overlap which was another rewarding experience for mentees, teaching faculty, and staff. The overlap program consisted of two full days of opportunities for exchange of ideas, networking, and discussing areas of potential research collaboration. Time was also spent fine tuning Specific Aims and Individual Career Development Plans and our annual Grant Writing Workshop was conducted by Dr. Rita Sarkar, Program Officer, National Heart Lung and Blood Institute. Interestingly, the two cohorts quickly bonded, identifying areas of research collaboration and extensive one-on-one conversations. The program was concluded with formal



scientific presentations by Cohort 6 mentees during which robust discussion and questions help to further expand the development of individual research projects and collaborations.

**Summer Institute II was held July 24-August 4, 2017**. Cohort 5 mentees were provided additional training in grant preparation and completed an NIH-style one-on-one grant review. This activity was complemented by didactic and lab practicum sessions related to proteomics and protein analysis. Summer Institute II was concluded with a passionate graduation ceremony during which mentees received their certificates of completion and "The Grant Applications Writer Workbook."




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

# **Eligibility Requirements**

To be eligible to participate in a PRIDE Summer Institute Training Program, you must:

- be a junior-level faculty member or scientist holding a doctoral degree, such as a PhD, MD, DO, DVM or a *transitioning*\* post-doctorate trainee
- be from a minority group that is under-represented in the biomedical or health sciences
- be a United States Citizen or Permanent United States Resident
- have a research focus that is centered on heart, lung, blood, or sleep disorders research; health disparities research relevant to heart, lung, blood, or sleep disorders; or relevant research methodologies and approaches specific to these areas

\*Transitioning means that you have or will have received a formal faculty appointment by the time the Summer Institute Program convenes.

- All expenses paid for a 3-week (on average) Summer Institute Training Program for two consecutive summers
- Year-long mentoring experience with recognized experts in the field
- Didactic coursework and hands-on practical training
- Specific training and coaching in grant-writing skills
- Mid-year meeting
- Annual Conference in Bethesda, Maryland
